International Conference, University of Oxford, China Centre

This international conference marking the centenary of the birth of Professor Michael Sullivan (1916-2013), pioneering scholar of modern and Chinese art, will focus on current and future research in the field of modern Chinese painting. Michael Sullivan was also a generous benefactor to the Ashmolean Museum, where his collection of modern Chinese art and his archive are now housed.
