A Workshop on Nicolas Lancret and Dance before a Fountain

May 5, 2006

Gallery S202 and GRI lecture hall

In 2001, the Getty acquired a major painting by Nicolas Lancret, the ca.1723 Dance before a Fountain, an outstanding example of the fête galante and one of the most significant paintings by the artist. This work intersects the themes of landscape, dance, music, conversation, the body, and social class, and in this richness, has become an anchor of the eighteenth-century collections of the Getty. Getty Publications has just published a study by Mary Taverer Holmes of this complex picture, Nicolas Lancret: Dance before a Fountain

This book situates the painting in Lancret's oeuvre and in the broader context of eighteenth-century European art and culture, uncovering new aspects of the dance and park setting, and presenting new information about the painting's collection history. Mark Leonard has also written a chapter regarding the painting's conservation, providing a new understanding of the artist's technique.

To celebrate the launch of the book, and to examine the continued scholarship on the artist, the J. Paul Getty Museum will hold a day-long workshop centered on the Getty painting, and all the talks and discussions will radiate specifically from this one object.

In tandem with this event, the museum will mount an installation of small-scale paintings by Lancret, including Nicaise and Two Friends, on long-term loan from the Clark Art Institute, and A Woman Seated on a Sofa, on loan from the Lynda and Stewart Resnick Collection.
