## PhD Studentship

The Art Market and the Formation of a National Collection at Tate  
c.1898-1940

Department of History of Art and Tate Britain

Arts and Humanities Research Council Collaborative Doctoral Award

The successful applicant will be jointly supervised by Dr Anna Gruetzner Robins and Mr Robert Upstone, Tate. There is a large archive of raw data at Tate relating to the formation of the collection that has not been given serious consideration.

The research will gather this data to identify the influential dealers and galleries, and look at the considerable role they played in establishing a national collection. Focusing on the artist-dealer system, the strategies for marketing, the role of the critic in establishing a market-value for a work of art, and the social and professional networks that facilitated these purchases it will locate works of art from the Tate collection back into the London art market.

Eligibility and application: In order to be eligible, applicants must meet the AHRC's academic criteria and residency requirements, and should normally have, or be studying for a Master's degree. The standard Home/EU tuition fee and maintenance grant will be paid by the AHRC.
