H-FedHist promotes the study and discussion of promote study and broad understanding of the history of the United States Federal Government by scholars, teachers, researchers, and other interested parties H-FedHist also supports the exchange of ideas and information between scholars on related H-Net networks. Finally, H-FedHist disseminates information about its sponsoring organizaton, the Society for History in the Federal Government (SHFG), to both SHFG members and non-members. It is a network developed in conjunction with the SHFG although it is open for all to join.

The Society for History in the Federal Government (SHFG) was founded in 1979 as a non-profit professional organization to promote study and broad understanding of the history of the United States Federal Government and to serve as the voice of the federal historical community. To achieve its goals, the Society brings together historians, archivists, archaeologists, curators, librarians, editors, preservationists, students, and others interested in government history.

Members of the Society for History in the Federal Government participate in an informal professional network that strengthens common interests and stimulates discussion of historical subjects and sources. The Society also serves as a medium through which its members express their common views and concerns. These broad benefits of membership are reflected in Society publications, meetings, awards and action committees.
