Working Group in Medieval Sculpture, 1100-1550 - A Transatlantic Dialogue: Sculptural Reception

After conferences in Paris (January 2012) on sculptural media and in Kalamazoo (May 2012) on sculptural objecthood, the third and final installment of this Working Group's Transatlantic Dialogue will be held in Philadelphia at the University of Pennsylvania and the Philadelphia Museum of Art.

Papers will examine sculptural uses and contexts and consider the affective, social, and economic responses they engendered. Presentations will also consider the influence on later artistic works, as well as the modern reception of medieval sculpture, including issues of display, museography, and conservation.
