How have ecocritical methods of studying, interpreting, and analyzing photographs created new ways of understanding the medium and its histories? Approaches informed by the interdisciplinary methods of ecocritical art history, environmental history, and the environmental humanities are reframing the subjects of photography, expanding the reading of images 'against the grain' of their dominant narratives. This panel calls for papers that explore the new directions of eco-photography and histories of photography's resource extraction, through case studies or explorations of methodology, either historical or theoretical. We are looking for new perspectives from across geographical regions and temporal periods to consider how eco-photography can bring greater insight to the urgent issues facing the planet and all its occupants. What does eco-photography offer the many participants in the photographic project, from makers to subjects to viewers? What does it offer the historian of photography and how does it expand the narratives of the medium?
