The Global Conservation: Histories and Theories Project (GloCo) at the University of Vienna, in partnership with the Cambridge Heritage Research Center at the University of Cambridge, invites you to attend the international conference Taking Root: Conserving Trees and/as Heritage, taking place on 29–30 October 2026 at the University of Vienna, Austria. The conference is free to attend, but registration is required.

Bringing together scholars, practitioners, artists, and filmmakers from across disciplines, the conference approaches trees as living heritage at the intersection of nature, culture, memory, and politics. Across topics ranging from sacred forests and Indigenous knowledge to climate change, colonial extraction, ecological violence, and artistic practice, the conference asks how trees shape – and are shaped by – histories of conservation, identity, and belonging.

The two-day program features panels on trees and art, sacred trees and forests, arboreal memory, environmental justice, more-than-human heritage, and the role of trees in archives, monuments, museums, and contemporary art. The program also includes a film screening and discussion, bringing together academic, artistic, and experimental approaches to the relationships between trees, communities, and conservation.

The conference welcomes multidisciplinary perspectives and different modes of engaging with trees as heritage, considering how conservation practices might account for the cultural, ecological, material, and political lives of trees.
