Aesthetics, Objectivity, and Interpretation in Archaeological Visual Practices

This one-day interdisciplinary symposium, organized in conjunction with the Fairfield University Art Museum exhibition James Welling: Cento (Walsh Gallery), brings together scholars whose work examines the visual construction of antiquity through archaeology, art history, photography, and digital reconstruction. Inspired by Welling's meditation on fragments, reproductions, and the afterlives of classical objects, the symposium asks how supposedly objective visualizations of the ancient world are themselves shaped through selection, mediation, and artistic intervention. The symposium is supported by the Fairfield University Art Museum, the Fairfield Humanities Institute, the Fairfield Department of Visual and Performing Arts, and the Fairfield Ancient Mediterranean Studies Program.

Before the symposium, on the evening of Thursday, October 15th (5:30pm EDT), Professor Emerita Katherine A. Schwab will deliver a keynote lecture titled "Altered States? The Shifting Impact of Our Visualizations of Antiquity," as part of the Edwin L. Weisl, Jr. Lectureships in Art History.
