L'Impressionnisme et la Politique

Some of the most challenging readings of French Impressionism have claimed that this movement was intrinsically political; that politics, in particular class relationships, lay at its core. Anglo-Saxon scholarship in particular has highlighted the strong political implications of the French Impressionist movement in the 1870s, and linked the group's dissolution in the 1880s to its retreat from politics. The scenes of bourgeois private and urban entertainment produced by American artists in an Impressionist style one generation later seem patently unconcerned with politics. Does the transformation of French Impressionism into an international style evacuate all possible forms of social critique at a moment when the art market itself was becoming international? Was the political voice of American Impressionism only to be heard in claims to "picture the nation" or were other, perhaps more subtle, messages at work?
