Panorama is published twice a year. The journal welcomes submissions that utilize the insights of traditional and new approaches to American art and visual culture, and which proceed from a range of disciplinary (and interdisciplinary) perspectives.

The inaugural Winter 2015 issue includes three feature articles:

The roundtable begins with a lead essay by Lauren Kroiz on the art historian Lester Longman's arguments for disciplinary reform during the interwar period, and includes short responses by Martin Berger, Erika Doss, JoAnne Mancini, Jennifer Jane Marshall, Alexander Nemerov, and Frances Pohl.
